
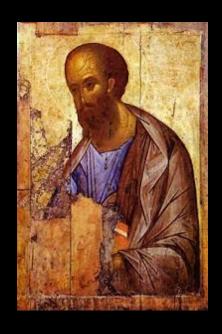

Thessalonica

<u>Thessalonica</u>

- Founded around 315 B.C., named after the half-sister of Alexander the Great.
- Capital of Greek Macedonia.
- Oldest Jewish population in mainland Europe.

<u>Thessalonica</u>

- City today has 1,000,000 people 2nd largest in Greece
- Home to Aristotle University with 40,000 students.
- The philosopher was born 30 miles away.
- Nicknamed "the co-capital" for its historic importance.





• Read Acts 17:1-14 for background.



- Paul spent less than a month in Thessalonica before he suddenly had to leave (Acts 17:1-10).
- Likely the second epistle written by Paul, after Galatians.
- In some ways it is a model church (1:8-10).
- This church also suffered for their faith (1:6, 2:14).

2 Corinthians 8:1-3 (ESV)

We want you to know, brothers, about the grace of God that has been given among the churches of Macedonia, ² for in a severe test of affliction, their abundance of joy and their extreme poverty have overflowed in a wealth of generosity on their part. ³ For they gave according to their means, as I can testify, and beyond their means, of their own accord.

An impressive depth of teaching:


- Topics include perseverance, love and holiness.
- Most prominent is eschatology the study of last things.
- All five chapters end with a reference to Christ's return.

Things to look for:

- An exemplary church.
- Faith leads to radical change.
- Affliction is to be expected.
- God's will.
- Christian behavior.
- Christ's Return.


Keep in mind as we read:

- Most were from a pagan background.
- It was now less than a year since the church got started.




1 Thessalonians 1:6-8 (ESV)

1 Thessalonians 3:4 (ESV)


For when we were with you, we kept telling you beforehand that we were to suffer affliction, just as it has come to pass, and just as you know.

1 Thess. 5:16 πάντοτε χαίρετε (14 letters) Rejoice always.

Bible Trivia: What is the shortest verse in the Bible in the original languages?

- There are others shorter yet, but it depends on the early Greek or Hebrew version used.
- Remember chapter and verse were later additions.
- Also Hebrew contains no vowels, making for shorter words.



• Let's look at key passages once more and review the lesson(s) we can learn from each.

 We'll now end with all of the verses that look forward to Christ's return.

1 Thessalonians 1:9-10 (ESV)

⁹ For they themselves report concerning us the kind of reception we had among you, and how you turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God, ¹⁰ and to wait for his Son from heaven, whom he raised from the dead, Jesus who delivers us from the wrath to come.

1 Thessalonians 2:19-20 (ESV)

¹⁹ For what is our hope or joy or crown of boasting before our Lord Jesus <u>at his coming</u>? Is it not you? ²⁰ For you are our glory and joy.

1 Thessalonians 3:11-13 (ESV)

¹¹ Now may our God and Father himself, and our Lord Jesus, direct our way to you, ¹² and may the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, as we do for you, ¹³ so that he may establish your hearts blameless in holiness before our God and Father, <u>at the coming of our Lord Jesus</u> with all his saints.

1 Thessalonians 4:16-18 (ESV)

¹⁶ For the Lord himself will descend from heaven with a cry of command, with the voice of an archangel, and with the sound of the trumpet of God. And the dead in Christ will rise first.

¹⁷ Then we who are alive, who are left, will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air, and so we will always be with the Lord. ¹⁸ Therefore encourage one another with these words.

1 Thessalonians 5:23-24 (ESV)

²³ Now may the God of peace himself sanctify you completely, and may your whole spirit and soul and body be kept blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. ²⁴ He who calls you is faithful; he will surely do it.
