

John 7 Introduction

- In this chapter, we see Jesus in Jerusalem for the Feast of Booths (Tabernacles).
- While there, as usual, he causes division between those who will listen to him and those who will not.
- As the Feast comes to its climax, Jesus makes an indirect claim to his deity.

- 7:2 the Feast of Booths (Tabernacles)
- This is one of the major feasts of Judaism and lasts for a full week during the fall.
- People build little huts (Sukkot) to eat and/or sleep in to remember the wilderness wanderings.
- This is still often practiced today.



- John 7:3-5 Christ's brothers are sort of encouraging him to go to Jerusalem and show off.
- This is a little like the devil tempting Jesus to jump off the pinnacle of the temple to prove his identity.
- They did not believe in him not yet at least.

- John 7:3-5 Later James and Jude became leaders in the church.
- If your faith is a point of disagreement in your family, you are in good company.
- Jesus dealt with the same sort of thing, only in a bigger way than we do.

- John 7:7 People still hate Jesus and for the same reason that he says here.
- Sin can be a sensitive topic, especially if we don't want to admit when we are wrong.
- As it turns out, this made Jesus a few enemies.
- Maybe you have dealt with the same thing when you have refused to call evil good and good evil.

John 7:8 (Evangelical Heritage Version)

You go up to the festival. I am not going up to this festival yet, because the right time for me has not yet arrived.

(God's Word Translation)

Go to the festival. I'm not going to this festival right now. Now is not the right time for me to go.

- The Gospel of John pushes people to make decisions about Jesus.
- We see the arguments and disagreements that took place when Christ was here on earth.
- Arguments still take place today over Christ and whether he was uniquely sent by God.

- According to Jesus he was not just another prophet.
- He had a unique relationship with God the Father and was uniquely sent by God the Father.
- See 7:16, 18, 28, 29 and 33.
- This is actually one of the keys to the relationships between the persons of the Trinity in John.

- In the Gospel of John, the Father is sent by no one, but instead sends the Son (e.g. 3: 17; 17: 3 etc.) and the Spirit (14: 26).
- The Son is sent by the Father and sends the Spirit (15: 26; 16: 7).
- The Spirit is sent by the Father and the Son but himself sends no one. ¹

- 7:37-39 The claim that Jesus makes about living water sounds like something he has said before.
- Think back to the Samaritan woman at the well.

John 4:10-14 (ESV)

who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water." ¹¹ The woman said to him, "Sir, you have nothing to draw water with, and the well is deep. Where do you get that living water? ¹² Are you greater than our father Jacob? ...

• John 4:10-14 (ESV)

... He gave us the well and drank from it himself, as did his sons and his livestock." ¹³ Jesus said to her, "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, ¹⁴ but whoever drinks of the water that I will give him will never be thirsty again. The water that I will give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life."

• The first use of this metaphor in Scripture goes back to Jeremiah.

Jeremiah 2:12-13 (ESV)

¹² Be appalled, O heavens, at this; be shocked, be utterly desolate, declares the LORD, ¹³ for my people have committed two evils: they have forsaken me, the fountain of living waters, and hewed out cisterns for themselves, broken cisterns that can hold no water.

- By applying this expression to himself in this way,
 Jesus is making an indirect claim to deity.
- If we forsake our false gods and turn to Jesus, rivers of living water will be ours.

- 7:40-49 Again, however, Christ divides people.
- Jesus is pushing people toward that decision.
- And John is using these stories to do the same to us.
- We can have rivers of living water or broken cisterns of our own making.

- 7:50-52 Nicodemus may already be persuaded.
- He has talked to Jesus personally and is not as quick to judge him as the rest of the religious leaders.
- It may be that he is already beginning to believe.



Nicodemus' question was meant to prick the consciences of his fellow Pharisees, but they brushed it aside. They had already made up their minds. They knew that Nicodemus was from Judea, ...

... but were implying that no Judean could possibly be taken in by Jesus. He was a Galilean and could only deceive Galileans. The Judeans were too bright to believe in him! ³

- The leaders in Jerusalem had an attitude that we might call spiritual elitism.
- We saw this beginning in 7:15, where they marvel at Christ's great learning.
- He didn't study under the elite rabbis or in the best rabbinical schools.
- But think about it: Who was going to truly teach him?

- They seem to think that because they are the best educated, they are also the most godly.
- This is incorrect.
- True conversion is even more a work of the heart than the head.

The basic human dilemma is not ignorance needing education; it is sinfulness needing redemption. ⁴

- This is what pushes people to that choice.
- The world is never going to be OK with Jesus telling it where it went wrong. What about us?
- Some others are too smart to imagine that they need an "ignorant" Christian faith. Again, what about us?

- Christ offers us the living water of the Holy Spirit's presence within us.
- The alternative is broken cisterns that cannot hold water at all.

- 1. We looked at relationships between the Persons of the Trinity and how the Son and the Spirit are sent.
- 2. Jesus said that the world hates him because he declares that its works are evil.
- 3. We also saw how spiritual elitism can keep people from a life-giving faith.
- 4. Finally, Jesus offers us "rivers of living water," which speaks of the Spirit's work within our hearts.
